"We were urged to get on-line, so the board approved a six-month test to see if it is something members like and will use. That will determine if we keep it," said AFPAAA Board Chairman Mike McRaney.

The AFPAAA web site has membership information, late-breaking news, and a variety of member services. It was designed and is being supported by John Gura through Enterprise Communications of Redlands, California. The only recurring cost to the Association is a \$25 per month hosting fee.

"We've built the site with two goals," said Gura. "First, we want to provide a service that is of real value to members and potential members. Second, we want to make it something we can all be proud of.

"We hope members will tell us what they'd like to see on the site and, if its possible, we'll try it.



"We want the experience of those who log onto our site to be enjoyable. That's why, along with the more serious contents, we've included and on-line Forum and a

MysteryPix." The Forum is a bulletin board style area where members can

comment on current events, discuss subjects of mutual interest, and speak up on whatever – within reason – they want. MysteryPix is a just-for-fun page where those who

look in are asked to identify who is in a photo. The photos used can date as far back as World War II.

"While most of the site is available to everyone, we're setting up security gates to limit access to a few pages to Association members only," Gura explained.

Plans include having our newsletter and membership directory on-line and downloadable as PDF files. A dedicated job listing area and a selection of career transition resources are also in the works – see 'Web Site Employment Opportunities' page .

"The use members make of the web site will determine if we keep it going," McRaney said. "Long range, with enough members able to access the web, we may distribute our newsletters and membership directories via the web. That would save a lot of printing and postage costs. What we have now is just the beginning if our members use the site."

Ernest G. Moore

Ernest G. Moore, died at his home in Palm Coast, Florida, on February 14, from complications due to emphysema. He was 67.

Ernie had assignments that included tours of duty in Spain; Da Nang, Vietnam; the Pentagon, and Andrews Air Force Base before he retired in 1974.

He became public affairs manager for Safeway in Landover, Maryland, a post he held until he

retired in 1987 when he moved to Florida. A native of Darlington, Pennsylvania, he graduated from Pennsylvania State University and earned a master's degree in Public Administration from George Washington University in 1965.

Ernie was chairman of the National Easter Seals Society in 1981. He is survived by his wife, Gladys, three daughters, a brother, and four grandchildren.

Kyle D. Perry

Kyle E. Perry, who was the principal French horn player of the Air Force Band died of liver and kidney failure February 24 at Bethesda Naval Hospital. He was 35.

Kyle was a native of Bedford, Indiana, and a graduate of Indiana University.

Octavian Slima

Strolling Strings violinist Octavian Slima, 44, died March 21.

Originally from Bucharest, Romania, he was a graduate with honors in violin performance of the Chicago Musical College and had a master of music degree and performer's certificate from Indiana University. Prior to joining the Air Force in 1987, he had been

the concertmaster of the Hong Kong and Caracas Symphony Orchestras, had performed on radio and television worldwide, and had given recitals on four continents.

He was a Master Sergeant at the time of his death and is survived by his parents, Leon and Emilia Slima, and brother, Mark, of Skokie, Illinois.

Mike Paoli Chosen 1996's 'Best of the Best'

Captain Michael J. Paoli received the 'Best of the Best' award as the top performer in Air Force Public Affairs on March 19.

The distinctive glass trophy was presented by Secretary of the Air Force Shelia Widnall and Air Force Public Affairs Alumni Association Chairman of the Board Mike McRaney during the World-Wide Public Affairs Conference's Annual Awards Banquet at the Xerox Conference Center in Leesburg, Virginia.

Captain Paoli was selected for the award because of his work during a variety of international crises while serving in Media Relations at Headquarters United States Air Forces in Europe.

He was the key Air Force Public Affairs Officer for the CT-43 crash that killed Secretary of Commerce Ron Brown. His backgrounders for the New York Times ensured accurate coverage in one of the

Richard L. Rapp

Dick Rapp was all Air Force. When the Air Force Public Affairs Alumni Association was launched, Dick was one of the first to take the big step of becoming a Lifetime Founder Member when there was no guarantee we would succeed.

With his wife, Betty, he was an active, ardent supporter, attending all our Annual Membership Meetings. With his death at age 67 on May 26 in Austin, Texas, after almost five months of hospitalization, he is the second Lifetime Founder to pass away.



He was born in Zanesville, Ohio, in 1929. A year later his family moved to Raymondville, Texas, and he considered himself a Texan. Dick began his Air Force career in the reserves and entered active duty in 1962. His assignments included Los Angeles Air

Force Station, Udorn RTAFB, the Office of Aerospace Research, Headquarters EUCOM, SAF/PA, and the National Military Command Center. He was Chief of the Plans Branch, News Division, Directorate for Defense Information, OASD/PA when he retired in 1985 as a Lt. Colonel.

James M. Stewart

Air Force Public Affairs lost one of its greatest assets when Jimmy Stewart died at 89 on July 2.

From the day he entered the Army as a private in 1941 until he passed away he was an unparalleled positive influencer of the public's image of the United States Air Force. And he will continue to be that positive influence as long as 'Strategic Air Command' is shown on television.

We're not going to give his life story here. That's been covered by the commercial news media. Instead, let's recall that with Jimmy Doolittle he was one of the key founders of the Air Force Association. Despite being one of

the biggest stars in Hollywood, he chose to continue to serve his country as a member of the Air Force Reserve, spending time in operations at SAC and ending his career as a Brigadier General in the Secretary of the Air Force Office of Information.

He often worked behind the scenes to help the Air Force. As Jerry Dalton said "He could make a phone call for you and make something happen."

Everybody who has been or now are now in Air Force Public Affairs can thank Jimmy Stewart for the Air Force image he projected on the screen and in person. We have all lost an irreplaceable friend.

world's most influential news media. His counsel to numbered Air Force and other senior commanders was what got them before print and electronic news media to tell the Air Force story. He also played a key role in preparing the brief given to the President, Congressmen, Air Force leaders, and the international press.

Mike performed as admirably in handling the Khobar Tower bombing in Saudi Arabia. He also provided media training for IFOR commanders and their staffs in Bosnia. He put together the theater-wide, EUCOM inclusive media plan that got coverage of the diverse United States missions in Bosnia.

Captain Paoli's abilities were summed up in the recommendation which said "PA shops speed dial Mike's number for dead-on reliable guidance, ranging from media response to interagency relationships and PA leadership techniques."

Reed Switzer - The Man Who Worked With Legends

For someone who had no background or training in journalism or public relations before entering military service, Reed Switzer had a stellar 30-year career in Air Force Public Affairs.

After high school graduation in his native Nebraska, Switzer moved to California in 1940 to work in the shipyards as war clouds formed in the Pacific. Drafted Dec. 7, 1942, he completed infantry training and was sent to England.

That began a career during which Switzer's dedication and professionalism touched thousands in and out of the military, including the likes of Ernie Pyle and Walter Cronkite.

"My buddies joined infantry units and I went to the War Correspondents' Branch of the European Theatre Office of Public Relations in London. It didn't take me long to see that it was a pretty good assignment."

Reed soon found himself in daily conversations with the likes of Ed Murrow, Ernest Hemingway, as well as Pyle and Cronkite.

"Most of those people, I never saw again. But I did see Cronkite after the war when he came to Omaha. He was about 30 at the time. He wasn't too old back then...none of us were."

Pyle provided a special relationship. "He arrived from Italy a month or so before D-Day. We seemed to hit it off and he asked me to take care of his fan mail. He got

a terrific amount.

"Days would go by without a letter. But when the ship came in there'd be bags of it for him. He insisted that I answer all the mail from military people. The rest was left at my discretion." Pyle went to France after D-Day and was en route back to London when Switzer

crossed the English Channel.

"But we corresponded up until...in fact, I got a letter from him after I heard he'd been killed.

He was on Guam at the time and it came through."

While stationed at Hickam AFB, Switzer visited Pyle's grave at the Punchbowl National Cemetery in Honolulu. Switzer donated a number of the letters he received from Pyle to the Whitte Museum in San Antonio.

There was an ironic twist to the Pyle relationship. Years after Pyle's death, Hollywood portrayed his life in a successful movie. The featured role was played by an actor Switzer knew in World War II as Capt. Burgess Meredith.

"He was one of our officers in London. We had several officers well known in public relations. There was Lt. Col. George Stevens, the Hollywood director, and Lt. Col. Herb Caen, the San Francisco columnist."

Group, Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio, where as a chief master sergeant he was the unit's ranking enlisted man and at the Military Personnel Center, Randolph AFB, Texas, his final assignment, where he was the Palace Info career advisor for Information's enlisted force.

With the Orientation Group, Switzer found himself part of one of the Air Force's greatest secrets. The select cadre of skilled military and civilian craftsmen never found a challenge they couldn't handle.

"We hand-picked our people. We had drivers, carpenters, electricians, every possible skill. Everyone interacted with the public. When we got to a display site, the drivers became displaymen. We had classes about the various weapon systems we had on display. They knew what they were talking about. Today, the Orientation Group is history, a victim of the budget."

At the Military Personnel Center, SAFOI wanted Switzer to evaluate its enlisted force as Don Burgrabbe had been doing with the officer corps. "MPC didn't want me to go that far. They do have a man there now. He's doing what I was sent there to do, but was really never able to do. What little bit I was able to accomplish, I did through the back door.

"Of all the jobs I had in the service, I think that Palace Info was the most satisfying. You were able to do a lot of things for a lot of people. While career progression was a big thing, assignments were also a great part. It was very satisfying when we were able to do those things."

Minutes – Fourth Annual Membership Meeting Air Force Public Affairs Alumni Association

**Wednesday, April 23, 1997
Blair House
Las Vegas, Nevada**

General – The Third Annual Membership Meeting of the Air Force Public Affairs Alumni Association was called to order at 9 AM on Wednesday, April 23, 1997, at Blair House, Las Vegas, Nevada, by the Association's President and Chairman of the Board of Directors, Mike McRaney.

Quorum – Secretary John Terino said the more than 70 full members attending the meeting met the quorum requirement.

Remembrance of Deceased – Mike McRaney asked all present to pause and remember members of the Public Affairs, Broadcasting, and Band communities who had passed away, including Edwin Dougherty, Ralph Evans, Fred Feldman, Ed Hilding, Ernie Moore, Kyle Perry, Octavian Slima, Larry Tacker, Smitty von Fossen, and Bob Webb.

Director of Public Affairs Brigadier General Ron Sconyers– Reported there are now four home pages on the World-Wide Web including a PA Link page, which is only for Public Affairs Officers, and an Air Force Issues page, both will be available to our members. He summarized the new Public Affairs Combat Training Course; the establishment of a Public Affairs Doctrine Center at Maxwell AFB; and AFA's choice of Public Affairs as the Air Force Team of the Year. General Sconyers said the Air Force Public Affairs Alumni Association had “ done more things for Air Force Public Affairs than you probably know you have . . . most important has been the recognition of our top people . . . we really appreciate what you have done. You have really helped us do a lot of things we couldn't have done.”

Treasurer's Report – Pete Aleandrakos reported that on March 31, the Association had a balance of \$45,215.80. He observed we are in good financial shape now largely because we continue to receive donated printing and mailing courtesy of Jim Hart and Duke Energy. He said we're keeping operating costs very low, but need to find ways to increase income so that when we must fund those costs we will be able to do so for the long term.

Membership – Neil Buttimer reported that we have 574 members. We did surpass 600 members early in the year, but some members did not renew. The combined renewal rate for one and three-year members is 84.5%

Publications – John Terino reported that, in addition to the Oral History and Tips For Transition publications, Charlie Brown's job counselling book was almost done; current plans are to make it available via floppy disk in any format requested.

Web Page – It was suggested an AFPAAA Home Page could reduce printing costs. Don Brownlee saw it as a supplement to what we currently publish. Ken Rogge and Al Eakle volunteered to help establish the page. John Gulick said that with AFPAAA's size there should be three or four people who could make a web page a reality. The Board will work the issue, including linking to SAF/PA's page for more visibility to active, guard, and reserve PA, Band, and Broadcasting people.

Oral History Program – John Gura said 38 interviews are done. Articles based on individual histories are in each issue of the newsletter. He said these are personal recollections of events, not documented factual accounts. Roy Whitton said he provided

copies of Oral Histories to a young PAO so he could see how things have evolved. John Terino suggested members could donate collections of Oral Histories to their local or collegiate libraries and that such donations would be tax deductible.

Special Events – Don Brownlee said the AFPAAA booth in the convention center was up and running. He also said he would work with SAF/PA on the September AFA luncheon.

Chairman's Report & Members Comments – Mike McRaney those who contributed to the Association's success this year and particularly Dave Shea, Al Eakle, and the others who worked on the Annual Membership Meeting

The Association is doing well and members should not be overly concerned with its finances but they should be aware of the situation and work hard at getting new members. Personal contacts extending invitations to join are the way to increase membership and ensure our viability.

Departing Board member Jim Reinhard, who served two terms, was presented a plaque by Mike in recognition of his service to the Association.

Mike and Board members wore Association golf shirts. He asked for feed-back from those present on willingness to purchase, style, etc. Matt Lipartiti said the shirt needs a pocket.

C. B. Kelly presented his hand carved wooden wing 'Daedelus' to the Association. Mike thanked C. B. and said the Board would discuss how the unique and generous gift would be used.

Mike reported that efforts to integrate with the active force were continuing. The Association is sponsoring gift memberships to recognize Air Force honor graduates of DINFOS. We are also providing assistance in PRSA accreditation to officer, enlisted, and civilian personnel who are AFPAAA members.

Al Eakle said AFPAAA is perceived as an 'officer organization.' Chuck Lucas said very few active duty PA Chief Master Sergeants were members. Mike asked for suggestions from all, but especially enlisted members, on how to increase retired and active duty enlisted membership.

Dave Cole suggested establishing a job listing. Hal Klee suggested a job listings fax on demand service. Mike asked Hal for more details and said the Board would consider starting a job listing.

Gil Whiteman suggested we expand honorary memberships to people such as the former head of public affairs for the Vietnamese Air Force, who resides in Virginia. It was clarified that AFPAAA has no honorary membership category, members are either Active or Associate, depending on if they are past or present Air Force PA, Band, or Broadcasting practitioners. Mike said our status as a veteran's organization could be jeopardized by a too expansive membership award program and we needed to see how the membership awards program we have now goes before we expanding it. Pete pointed out that up to now we had only given one membership award - a one year associate - to the Best of the Best winner.

Bob Hunter asked if efforts were made to establish relationships with organizations with similar interests, affinities, etc., such as Air Force Times for its web page. Mike said we had contacted or been contacted by groups, but they had been unsuccessful because they had their own agendas.

Future Funding – John Gulick said we should have a corporate development plan and committee in place looking at membership and finances, but we should not cut services and we should stop living beyond our means. Don Burgrabbe asked if we had ever considered a formal fund raising program to corporations who have development and charity programs. Mike said we had begun work on that with Jim Hart heading the effort, we were considering it seriously, but that we needed to do more and might come back to John Gulick and Don for assistance.

Annual Meeting – Dave Shea said the 1998 Annual Membership Meeting would be at Wright-Patterson AFB with Tom LaPolc serving as the on-site chairman. Current plans are for on-base accommodations and dinner at the Air Force Museum. Dates and details will be in the newsletter.

Adjournment – With no other business to conduct the meeting was adjourned.

He also served as the Special Events Chairman, handling the Annual Air Force Association Convention Alumni Luncheon.


