

Candidate Nominations For Six Open Seats In Board Of Directors Election Due Feb. 1

Any Full Member of AFPAAA in good standing can run for one of the six open seats in the upcoming AFPAAA Board of Directors election. Successful candidates will serve a two-year term beginning July 1.

A member who wants to be a candidate should make that known by February 1 to the nominating committee headed by Tom Dolney by submitting their nomination packet to him at: tomdolney@afpaaa.org

The packet should include a one or two paragraph resume/biography that would encourage members to vote for

them if accepted by the committee for placement on the ballot. It should briefly sketch their qualifications; how they have supported AFPAAA, and why they want to be on the Board of Directors. A head and shoulders picture, either jpeg or TIFF format, or a print suitable for scanning, should be included.

Potential candidates should understand that in being a member of the Board states their willingness to enter the leadership progression to potentially become secretary, vice president, president, and ultimately chairman of the Board.

The ballot will be in April's News & Notes and on-line voting via AFPAAA's website will also be available. Election results will be announced during the business session of AFPAAA's 27th Annual Membership Meeting, Saturday, May 2 in Fairborn, Ohio.

Five members of the Board with terms expiring June 30 – Brett Ashworth, John Dorrian, John Gura, Doug Kennett, and Carla Sylvester – are seeking reelection. Current board member Bryan Bouchard is not running so he can concentrate on his new business venture.

Senate Confirms AFPAAA's Rob Palmer To Brigadier General As SAF/PA MA

Rob Palmer, the SAF/PA Mobilization Assistant (MA) and an AFPAAA Life Member, has been promoted to brigadier general. An Air Force Reservist assigned as the MA to the SAF/PA Director, Brigadier General Ed Thomas, he was confirmed by the Senate and promoted to brigadier general on November 21.

Brigadier General Palmer has been the SAF/PA MA since June 2018. Prior to his current assignment he was the Individual Mobilization Augmentee (IMA) Special Assistant for Public Affairs, Office of the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs.

Palmer's full-time job is Vice President of Government Relations for WPS Health Solutions, Madison, Wisconsin. He is the liaison to the state legislature, the U.S. Congress, state and federal agencies, and military beneficiary associations for the insurance company.

During his 31 years of active duty and reserve service he has had a variety of assignments that have prepared him for the SAF/PA MA position.

A 1990 graduate of The Citadel with a commission in the Army National Guard, from then until 2003 he served in a number of artillery and Public Affairs positions and as

aide to the Adjutant General of the Indiana National Guard. He was deployed to Bosnia-Herzegovina for six months as a media operations officer.

In 2003 General Palmer transferred to the Air Force Reserve as an Air Mobility Command IMA. A year later he had the first of a series of Active Guard Reserve tours as the Chief of Strategic Communications for Employer Support of the Guard. During one of those tours he deployed to Southwest Asia as USCENTAF-FWD chief of media operations.

Among his subsequent assignments were Deputy Director of the Legislative Affairs Directorate, North American Aerospace Defense Command and U.S. Northern Command and the Air Staff. After three years as the Director of Public Affairs, Air Force Reserve Command, he left active duty in 2015 and became IMA to the Chief of Public Affairs at USTRANSCOM.

Two Lifetime Founders, Don Brownlee and Jim Reinhard have been recognized for their military and community service by the little known organization Quilts of Valor, (QOV). Don's quilt, the first QOV completed by ten members of the Quirky Quilters who are from the Rehoboth Beach, Delaware area, was presented in April.

Jim received his with seven other veterans in October in Hendersonville, North Carolina. It was made by members of the Blue Ridge Chapter of the QOV Foundation,


"I personally feel that Jim Reinhard and I are merely two of an extremely honored group numbering over several hundred thousand service men and women who have received quilts from these dedicated quilters since the Quilts Of Valor Foundation was formed in 2003," Don said.

"I'm personally honored for this recognition," Jim observed. "I share Don's feelings wholeheartedly. Credit belongs to these people nationwide who give freely of their time and talent to honor former service members."

Since retiring from Northrop Grumman, Jim and wife Kathy have been "enjoying life in the beautiful mountains of Western North

Carolina. He is active in his church, the local homeowners association, and the Hendersonville Kiwanis Club's projects that benefit the children of the county.

After Don's Air Force retirement in 1987 he was in Aerojet's Washington, DC Government Relations office. He was Vice-President of Washington Operations when left in 2007. Don and his wife, Jeanne, who passed away two years ago, moved to Delaware where he resides. He



spends his time with his daughters, Julie and Dina and their families in Connecticut and Maryland; travels occasionally, and enjoys his passion for cars.

The Quilts of Valor Foundation began modestly in 2003 when Catherine Roberts' son, Nat, was deployed in Iraq and she realized the traumatic effects war could have and the need for something to comfort those who served. Her solution - give them a homemade quilt so they could wrap themselves in its warmth and that labor of love.

The first Quilt of Valor was presented in November 2003 at Walter Reed Army Medical Center to a young soldier from Minnesota who had lost his leg in Iraq.

Since then QOV has continued to grow with groups of quilters in 50 states. More than 240,000 quilts have been presented by QOV which

became a national non-profit in 2005. The mission of the foundation's all-volunteer hand and machine quilters is "to cover service members and veterans touched by war with comforting and healing Quilts of Valor".

Peter Alexandrakos

AFPAAA Lifetime Founder Pete Alexandrakos died October 14 from cerebral complications following a fall a few days earlier. He was 76.

Pete was born in Brooklyn, New York. He earned a BS degree, with a major in marketing and a minor in journalism, and an AFROTC commission from New York University in 1963. He had a Master's degree in management from Central Michigan University.

During his 28-year Air Force career he served primarily as a public affairs officer but also was a Titan II ICBM missile launch officer, combat crew commander and instructor combat crew commander. His Public Affairs assignments included 7th Air Force headquarters, Vietnam; Strategic Air Command headquarters, Offutt AFB; 43rd Strategic Wing and 3rd Air Division, Andersen AFB; SAF/PA, the Pentagon; Air Force Systems Command, Andrews AFB, and 15th Air Force, March AFB. Pete was Director for Plans, Office of the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Public Affairs when he retired as a colonel in 1991.

He then worked for United Services Planning Association before becoming The MITRE Corporation's public affairs manager in Washington.

Pete is a co-founder of the Air Force Public Affairs Alumni Association. He served five years on the Association's first board of directors, eight years as treasurer, and in 2001 was the first recipient of the Association's Mike McRaney Distinguished Service Award.

He is survived by his wife of 53 years, Judy; daughter, Pam; son-in-law, David, and grandchildren, Lia and Michael. Pete will be interred at Arlington National Cemetery at a future date.

Pete Alexandrakos was the epitome of professionalism. Although we never served together, our paths crossed several times. It was when the Air Force Public Affairs Alumni Association was founded in late 1993 that I really got to know him and admire his talents. We were on the Association's first Board of Directors. As treasurer, Pete helped guide the fledgling organization through growing pains. He wrote a personal check for \$300 and became, with John Terino, the first dues-paying and Lifetime Founder Member of AFPAAA. Because of his hard work and dedication, Pete was chosen to receive the first Mike McRaney Distinguished Service Award in 2001. Rest in peace, my friend.

Jordan E. 'Buzz' Rizer

Buzz Rizer, who had a 50-year career in military and government service died November 5. He was 91.

He was born in Chicago and earned his bachelor's degree from the University of Chicago and had advanced degrees from George Washington University, the University of Liverpool, England, and the Harvard School of Government.

After serving in the Army, Buzz became an Air Force officer. His assignments included Chief of Protocol, Space Systems Division; executive officer AFN Frankfurt; and commander 7122 Broadcasting Squadron. He retired as a lieutenant colonel in 1971.

Buzz then began his civilian government career with the Navy. He served as Chief of Navy Broadcasting, Director of Navy Broadcasting, and the Department of the Navy's Assistant Chief of Information Radio and Television. Buzz is credited with the vision for and as the architect of putting television systems aboard Navy ships communication and entertainment.

He moved to DoD, joining the American Forces Information Service where he became a member of the Senior Executive Service and director of AFIS. He retired from AFIS in 1998.

Buzz is survived by sons, Timothy, David, Eric, and Jeffery and daughter Shawn; grandchildren, William, Viola, Michael, Martin, Cyndi, Bailey, Jordan, Alexander, Nicholas, Shaun, Tiffany, Kenneth, Elizabeth, Anthony and Kathleen; 20 great-grandchildren, and one great-great grandchild. His wife, Norma, and his daughter, Colleen preceded him in death.

One of the greatest men I've ever known took his last breath this morning. He was my Boss, my best friend, my father in law and my Pop. Jordan Edward (Buzz) Rizer was professionally the most unselfish, dedicated military and civilian public servant. Nearly all of his life he served his country and the Department of Defense, first in uniform, Army and Air Force, then as a civilian, Director of Navy Broadcasting Service (Armed Forces Radio and Television), and retired as an Assistant Secretary of Defense (Director, American Forces Information Service). I was blessed to work with him

for many years. My life was immensely touched by this man. He introduced me to my husband. He was a wonderful grandfather to my children. I love you Pop. I know, I know, you "love me more." Despite Buzz's success, he never took himself too seriously. He had the Midas touch, and he willingly and relentlessly applied it. With all his gifts and skill sets, he could have been a mega-millionaire but chose instead to serve the military services with his relentless dedication, professionalism, and boundless energy. He was a loving husband and father who thoroughly enjoyed his family. Even though we all knew his real name was Jordan, we easily understood why he was appropriately called Buzz.
