Air Force Association Grants \$1,000 To Oral History Program

The Air Force Association's Aerospace Education Foundation has made a \$1,000 grant to help further the Oral History Program. An additional \$50 tax-deductible donation from a member who wishes to be anonymous has also been received.

Phillip E. Lacombe, managing director of the Aerospace Education Foundation, said in his letter transmitting the grant that the oral histories "should be of great use to Air Force students, scholars, and historians."

Air Force Public Affairs Alumni Association Oral History Program Chairman John Gura said, "These are a real help. We want to make the program self-sustaining through grants and individual tax-deductible donations." The Air Force Public Affairs Alumni Association has established an award program with SAF/PA. President Mike McRaney presented the first 'Best of the Best' Award and a 1-year Association membership in March to Senior Airman James H. Cunningham, III at SAF/PA's World Wide Public Affairs Conference.

The 'Best of the Best' Award, designed by John Terino and crafted by the Corning Glass Works, will be presented to the Air Force's outstanding Public Affairs professional selected by SAF/PA each year.

"Jim Cunningham was the clear winner," McRaney said.

Airman Cunningham's broadcasting work with the Air Force News Agency (AFNEWS) earned him the award. His story on the return of the remains of Vietnam War dead merited a Gold Plaque as the best video news release at the International Communication Film and Video Festival, and his work on the Air Force Television Network production team helped garner a Gold Screen Award from the National Association of Government Communicators.

Cunningham has been selected to attend Officer Training School.

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Oral Histories Available To Members & Public For Tax-Deductible Donations To Help Program

The words of Public Affairs professionals who were there and intimately involved in some of the most significant events in American history since 1940 are now available to members of the Air Force Public Affairs Alumni Association and the general public.

The Association's Oral History Program has 19 interviews on tape. Eight of them have been fully transcribed. The remainder are in various stages of completion and will be ready shortly.

With the presentation of the first interviews to the Air Force Academy Library June 16, the project is well on its way to making these firsthand views of events available to scholars, authors, and future generations of Public Affairs professionals.

How did Barney Oldfield handle the Russians in Berlin?

The transcripts are being placed at selected military institutions, professional societies, and civilian universities. The first transcripts were turned over to the Air Force Academy Library during the Annual Meeting in June.

How did Dick Abel work the 1st POW flight into Hanoi?

But as word spread of the effort, members of our Association said they would like to be able to get copies for their personal reading and libraries and for gifts to friends and family.

The matter was placed before the Association's Board of Directors. Initially,

the thought was to sell the transcripts. But determining a single, universal price for the transcript that would cover the costs involved in acquiring, transcribing, laying out, printing, binding, and shipping was virtually impossible.

Taking a page from Public Broadcasting's book, the Board decided that rather than sell the transcripts they

would be offered as incentives for donations to the Association that would be used to help fund the Oral History Program.

Association members will be able to obtain transcripts for a taxdeductible donation of \$25 each or they can get five transcripts of their choice for a \$100 donation.

Non-members of the Association can order transcripts for tax-deductible donations of \$35 per transcript.

William J. McGinty

Born in Trenton, Ontario, Canada; grew up in Pennsylvania; trained as a fighter pilot by the Royal Canadian Air Force in 1941; Mac survived and returned to flying after a crash in a Spitfire in which he sustained spinal injuries that kept him bedridden and in therapy for a year.

He transferred to the Army Air Forces in 1942; was credited with three and a half German aircraft shot down during 85 missions; and was a P-51 squadron commander in World War II.

Captain McGinty, at the age of twenty-six in 1945, had achieved what most people would consider a legendary life-time. But, there was a lot more to come.

Mac entered Public Affairs in 1948 as an Information Officer at Headquarters Air University, Maxwell AFB, Alabama. He was Deputy and Acting Director of Information for Far East Air Forces, Tokyo, during the Korean War years of 1950-1952. During his career he was instrumental in putting the Air Force's intercontinental ballistic missile and space programs before the American people.

McGinty battled the public affairs bureaucracies and biases of the Department of Defense and the Military Assistance Command -Vietnam (MACV) in 1965-66 to bring the Air Force's story to the American people.

Mac's Public Affairs expertise was recognized in 1966 when the Aviation and Space Writers Association presented him the Orville Wright Award. He retired as a colonel in 1967 and was Director of Public Affairs for The Boeing Company in Washington, DC. until 1985.

Pursuing the concern for family, friends, and people in general that he had known throughout his life, Bill McGinty was an active member of the Gideons International. He died of a heart attack at his home in Alexandria, Virginia, on May 31.

Minutes – Second Annual Membership Meeting Air Force Public Affairs Alumni Association

General – The Second Annual Membership Meeting of the Air Force Public Affairs Alumni Association was called to order at 9 AM on Saturday, June 17, 1995, at the Marriott Hotel, Colorado Springs, Colorado, by the Association's President and Chairman of the Board of Directors, Mike McRaney. A memento of the meeting was distributed to all in attendance.

Frank Jennings was summoned to the front of the lectern and the assemblage visited upon his ears a loud, if not exactly melodious, rendition of the birthday song for his 78th birthday.

Mike McRaney expressed the Association's appreciation to Jim Hart and Panhandle Eastern Corporation for the reception they sponsored prior to dinner at the Fine Arts Center the previous evening. He conveyed Jim's regrets at not being present due to an emergency involving his company.

Outgoing Board of Directors member Gene Sands, who was instrumental in getting the Association off the ground, was presented a plaque for his service on the Board (similar plaques were sent to Marv Braman, Ted Daniel, and John Gulick).

Mike also praised Dave Shea; Jim Moore and his volunteers – Barry Grossman, Ron Hinkle, Fred Muerer, George Titus, and Ed Robertson; and Air Force Academy Director of Public Affairs Joe Purka, and Judy Bruns of his office, for their work in making the meeting a success. John Terino was complimented for the World War II booklet distributed at the dinner.

Quorum – Secretary John Terino reported that the more than 75 full members attending the meeting met the quorum requirement and the meeting could proceed.

Membership – Membership Chairman Neil Buttimer could not be present. Pete Alexandrakos delivered his report. On June 13, 1995 the Association had 504 members₇ – 110 Lifetime Founder; 1 Lifetime; 263 three-year; and 130 one-year. Of the 504 members, 387 held Full membership status; 18 were active duty Lifetime Founder or Lifetime members; and 99 were Associate members. Efforts to retain the 188 one-year members up for renewal at the end of 1994 were 85% successful, well beyond our projection of 60%. Factoring in the members lost in the past year, the Association grew by 155 members from the 378 on the rolls on June 7, 1994. Pete also noted the additions of Russ Tarvin, Mike Cox, and Peg Bowman since the meeting began, bringing the membership to 507.

Since last year's meeting, the Membership Committee had compiled and distributed two directories, one in September 1994 and the other in May of 1995. The latest edition marks an improvement from the first effort with the addition of e-mail addresses and printing on pre-punched three-hole paper for those members who wish to put it in a binder. He stressed that the Association will not distribute the directory to non-members, even if they are willing to pay for it. Consideration is being given to publishing a supplemental listing, that would include new members and updates, six months after directory publication.

Through the efforts of John Gulick, the cooperation of Keith Ferris and Jim Hart, the Association's distinctive membership certificate was developed and printed. Then, Alice Price found a calligrapher to personalize each certificate.

Association Delivers On Members' 1994 Meeting Motions

A recruiting brochure, designed by John Terino, was published. It has been effective in responding to requests for information about the Association and recruiting new members. The Association will be working on being more active in its recruiting efforts. Notices in *The Retired Officer, Air Force* magazine, and other publications have brought many inquiries, with 35-40 resulting from an article in the May edition of the *Afterburner*.

Mike McRaney pointed out that mass mailings were given careful consideration, but due to the cost the best means of recruiting new members is by personal contact.

Charlie Brown raised the question of membership eligibility for film and photographic personnel. Mike McRaney said that they, as well as other allied career fields, had been considered when the Association was established and a decision was made to limit membership to PA and broadcasting personnel.

Mike McRaney urged members to personally sign up or give gift memberships to people they know to bring them into the Association. Particular attention is needed to get recent retirees to ensure continuity. He challenged each member to recruit two new members by next year. Dave Shea passed out recruiting brochures.

Finances – Treasurer Pete Alexandrakos presented the financial report from June 1, 1994 through May 31,1995, exclusive of the 1995 Annual Membership Meeting. The Association began the period with \$18,259.20. Income – sources included membership dues, investment interest, a donation to the Oral History Program and 1994 Annual Membership Meeting registration fees – amounted to \$31,744.90 (the largest source of income was the 62 new and upgraded Lifetime Founder and Lifetime Members). The Association incurred expenses of \$19,693.44 during the year, leaving it with a balance of funds of \$30,310.66.

The budget year runs from October 1 through September 30 to coincide with our accounting year for tax purposes. Our initial budget was very conservative and we had to revise projected income and expenses upward. We anticipate a surplus at the end of the budget year. Thanks to Jim Hart, we have avoided thousands of dollars in printing and postage expenses for the newsletter and members are encouraged to express their appreciation to Jim for this support. We have \$25,000 invested in three certificates of deposit.

We are in good financial shape right now, but our big challenge for next year is to generate enough income to cover expenses without touching our investments. Next year only one-year memberships are due for renewal. If all renew, that will only give us about \$3,000 of income. New memberships will add to that total. Our routine operating expenses are under \$1,000 per quarter, larger expenditures are considered by the Board as the situation dictates. It is clear that dues alone will not cover the Association's expenditures and to avoid using our reserves we are looking at other sources of income to support the Association's activities.

John Rose said that Air Force Association chapters provided a block on their renewal forms for donations in addition to dues and suggest that we do likewise. The Board will give that consideration.

Election – Chuck Lucas, with the aid of C. Gordon Furbish, was responsible for tabulating the ballots. One hundred fifty-one ballots were cast for the four two-year seats on the Association's Board of Directors. Jim Hart, Kathy McCollom, and Dave Smith were elected as new Board members, and Jim Reinhard won reelection.

Oral History Program - John Gura reported on the project that

originated from last year's annual meeting. He pointed out that until now, no one had taken the time to collect the lessons learned and the historical, and sometimes hysterical, experiences of Air Force Public Affairs people to benefit military and civilian students and practitioners of public affairs, as well as authors.

Since starting last year, the program has stayed within budget. Sixteen people have been interviewed, six more are scheduled to be interviewed by the end of the fiscal year (Sept. 30), and 15-20 more will be done next year. In addition to the Air Force Academy Library, which yesterday accepted the first group of completed interviews, the Defense Information School at Fort Meade, and the Air Force Historical Research Agency at Maxwell AFB will house the collection. Through the work of Jerry Dalton, the collection will be archived at the Public Relations Society of America Resource Library in New York City, Boston University, the University of Florida at Gainsville, Purdue University, San Diego State University, and the University of Texas at Austin.

Scotty Duncan asked if he could approach the Director of the University of Wisconsin School of Journalism about receiving the histories and was encouraged to do so. Sam Giammo suggested that we also place the collection at the University of Oklahoma.

Dave Smith suggested that the collection be made available on disks. John Terino raised the issue of keeping control of the work in the Association and the copyright problems that might arise. John Gura said that the disk issue would be investigated along with selling published interviews to help support the program. Fred Muerer raised the issue of preserving documents with the oral histories. That is being considered, but no direct action has yet been taken.

Award Program – Mike McRaney reported that an award program with SAF/PA had been established. The Association is sponsoring for ten years the 'Best of the Best' award to the top Air Force Public Affairs practitioner as selected annually by SAF/PA. The first award was presented in March.

AFA Luncheon – The Association, beginning last September, now co-sponsors with SAF/PA the annual luncheon at the AFA meeting. This provides an opportunity to gain associate members from the active duty force as well as retirees who have not yet joined.

Smithsonian's Enola Gay Exhibit – The Association joined other groups in insisting that any display accurately reflect the history of WW II in the Pacific. This resulted in the Enola Gay exhibit being revised and the head of the Air and Space Museum resigning.

Regionalization – Ben Scarpero suggested monthly regional activities as means to stimulate recruiting. The Board will consider if and how this should be done.

Strategic Planning– Dave Schillerstrom, who chaired the strategic planning effort, explained that when he chose his planning team, it was important that they be representative of the Association with enlisted, civilian, and officer; retired and active duty; and male and female members. The group that was formed addressed six major areas: purpose and goals; organization and leadership structure; programs and publications; relationships with other organizations; membership issues; and financial matters.

A draft and revisions were done between January and May. Major contributors were Don Brownlee, Neil Buttimer, Bob Hunter, Hugh Burns, Chuck Cooper, Art Dederick, June Forte, Mike Gallagher, Marv Harris, Darrell Hayes, Don Hilkemeier, Frank Jennings, Vince Tocci, Peg Moffett, Bob Nicholson, John Ohlsen, Dave Smith, Mike Warden, Walt Werner, and Harry Zubkoff.

Mike McRaney thanked Dave and the people who helped him for their efforts and passed out a summary of the draft strategic plan and the issues it raised. He also discussed the Board's review of the strategic planning effort in terms of where the Association has been, what was recommended, and where it should go.

He pointed out that the Association had accomplished much in its first 18 months: it was legally established, obtained more than 500 members, provided two membership directories and a distinctive membership certificate, held two elections, established the Oral History Program, co-sponsored the SAF/PA-AFA luncheon, conducted two annual meetings, established the 'Best of the Best' Award, and began an investment program to secure the financial base of the Association for the future.

He said the Board reviewed the Strategic Planning Committee recommendations on: membership recruiting and retention goals; finances; fund raising strategies and the dues structure; member benefits and services, including local/regional activities; honoring deceased and ill members; interactive electronic forums; a job bank; professional development programs; transition assistance for those leaving the Air Force; a lifetime achievement award; a mentor/ advisor program with the active duty force; and projects, such as an archival collection of Air Force Public Affairs related artifacts and documents; a mechanism for regular interface with national military organizations, professional associations, and universities; and a capability to communicate to publics beyond AFPAAA using news releases, speakers, seminars, and workshops. That review raised three key questions for the Board:

- 1. What will these proposals cost and where will the money come from to support them?
- 2. Who will do the work to ensure the proposals succeed?
- 3. What does the membership want the Association to be in the future and how do we find that out?

In a unanimous vote, the Board decided that the proper way to address those questions was through a membership survey to determine what activities the Association should undertake and the willingness of the membership to pay higher dues, make tax deductible donations, and volunteer to lead or work on activities. The survey will be developed and provided to the members later this year.

McRaney pointed out that money and time, as well as the members wishes, are the real drivers. Members of the Board and committee chairmen are spending a lot of time making current activities and projects a reality. If we are going to do some of the things that were suggested, volunteers to do the work and a willingness to provide additional financial support are needed.

Russ Tarvin asked about an accreditation relationship with PRSA. That will be considered. Right now we encourage accreditation but would need substantial financial and personnel resources to establish our own program.

Wally Miller asked about e-mail addresses in our directory. They are included if the members submitted them. A quick survey of the members present indicated that about 50% could receive electronic mail.

Ben Scarpero volunteered to make available SAF/OI & SAF/ PA rosters dating back to the 1950s for use in identifying potential new members.

Dick Rapp asked about the electronic AF Home Page and if we could get its number. We will do so and put it in the newsletter.

Don Brownlee asked if we could become part of the AF Home Page in ways such as having our newsletter included. There might be legal obstacles to including AFPAAA and, even if it could be done, somebody would have to work it in Washington. Brownlee volunteered to take on the task of finding out what relationship could be established. Mike Terrill volunteered to determine how an independent AFPAAA Home Page could be established and what would be needed to sustain it.

Charlie Brown volunteered to work on putting a transition package together for those leaving the service. Mike McRaney said that the board needed to define what it wanted to do in that area but would count on Charlie to work it once a course had been determined.

Bob Hunter warned about the membership being 'lulled' to sleep by the in-kind services the Association receives and the impact if those services had to be paid for. Mike McRaney and Alice Price pointed out the membership certificates would have cost approximately \$10,000; John Terino said that printing and mailing costs of the newsletter would run about \$7,000 per year and that the writing, editing, design, and layout would run another \$10,000-\$12,000 per year – without the donated efforts, the newsletter alone could eliminate 80% of the Association's cash reserves in just a year.

Mike Terrill suggested we consider corporate sponsorships. He also suggested that members be reminded at the end of the year when they are doing their last minute tax planning that tax deductible donations can be made. McRaney said that corporate sponsorship was being explored and that the donation reminder was a good idea.

Sam Lessey pointed out that the Aviation and Space Writers Association was a case study in how an organization collapsed financially. McRaney said the Board was aware of that and was looking closely at how that happened.

McRaney urged the members to take the surveys seriously when they get them and provide meaningful feedback.

Pete Alexandrakos asked for more volunteer 'worker bee' support, particularly from the 'retired-retired community' because we could use it.

Annual Meeting –Mike McRaney announced that the Association's 1996 meeting would be in Hampton, Virginia, with Dave Smith as the on-site chairman, and that Colonel Ron Rand had agreed to host us at Air Combat Command Headquarters at Langley AFB. Dates for the meeting would be established in 60 days and published in the newsletter. He added that the Association had deliberately stayed away from the East Coast for the first two meetings to reflect the national scope of the Association and to aid recruiting.

Scotty Duncan asked about how he could bid to host a future meeting in either Santa Fe or Taos, New Mexico. Mike said that bids for future sites would be accepted two years in advance and all that had to be done was to submit a proposal by mail or fax to him. Dave Shea pointed out that for the '97 meeting the plan is to tie into the Air Force Association's Gathering of Eagles in Las Vegas.

Mike McRaney called for other items of business. There were none.

Adjournment - Bill Anderson stated that those who had put on the meeting had done 'one hell of a job' and moved that the meeting be adjourned; there were numerous seconds and the motion passed unanimously.
