He then cited many contributors, including Barney Oldfield, Bill McGinty, Maury Casey, Sory Smith, Jerry Dalton, Frank Jennings, Bill Greener, and Mike Burch.

Treasurer Reports Financial Status Solid

"AFPAAA is financially strong and its balance sheet continues to grow," said Treasurer Jim Hart in his mid-year report. At the end of January AFPAAA had an endowment fund worth \$201,353, \$18,283 in its checking account, and \$15,972 in its money market account. AFPAAA's total net worth was \$235,608 with all bills paid.

"Since the first \$200 from Pete Alexandrakos and John Terino, that got AFPAAA started in 1994, the board has provided excellent stewardship of the dues and contributions from our members." Jim observed. "Our largest asset, the endowment fund, has grown since it was started in 1997, from the first \$5000 pledge to a current value, just seven years later, of more than \$200,000."

The fund's initial goal was \$300,000 to provide a source of income for operations and to ensure AFPAAA would be able to provide member services in the future. "As of December 31, we have received gifts and pledges from 98 members of \$156,494 and we still have \$6,033 in pledges outstanding," Hart reported. The remainder of the fund's total has come from investment gains.

He urges those who haven't contributed to the endowment fund, to consider doing so now. All donations are tax deductible. Pledges of \$5,000 over a five period will be recognized with a Gold Level award at the next Annual Membership Meeting; \$3,000 gets a Silver Award, and \$1,000 a Bronze Award. Ed Johnson, who chaired AFPAAA's memorial project, died on February 4th, in San Antonio. He was 74.

He was born in New Haven, Connecticut; graduated from Williston Academy and Hobart College, and earned a Masters Degree from Boston University School of Communications.

Duringa22-yearcareerhisassignments included7thAirForceHeadquarters, Vietnam; SAC Headquarters; and as the Palace Info Officer atAFMPC in the mid 1970s. He retired as a Lieutenant Colonel in 1975.

Ed's post Air Force career in public relations included work for the SanAntonio Chamber of Commerce and other firms in the area. He became an avid sailor and was Commodore of the Lake Canyon Yacht Club, and chair of the Youth Sailing Foundation. He is survived by his wife Yvonne, three daughters, two sons, and six grandchildren.

Art Mathison

Art Mathison died January 9, from a heart attack in Wilford Hall Medical Center, San Antonio, Texas. He was 72. I learned of his death from his widow, Billie. Billie and Art married at age 17 in the small town of Deer Lodge, not far from Missoula., Montana.

During his career in uniform he served in Germany and Thailand. Art and I worked together when he was a major in the Internal Information Division of SAF/PA in the 1970s. After he retired, I persuaded him to come from Dead Wood, South Dakota, where he edited a weekly newspaper, settle in San Antonio, and work as the civilian head of the Air Force Newspaper Program.

Art engendered enormous affection and admiration from everyone who worked with him. He always reflected the education, training, and professionalism from his journalism and communication courses at the University of Montana in Missoula. He graduated in 1955 with a master of arts degree. He loved music and very large pet dogs by the pair. He had a warm feeling for others and an explosive laugh. He and Billie raised a son and daughter who are teachers in San Antonio.

When I passed the word about Art's departure, the response was quick and deeply heartfelt. A large newsletter would be needed to print them all.

Oscar Dixon, Pro Basketball Editor of USA TODAY wrote: "Art Mathison was my mentor. The success I have had at USA TODAY is because of Art. He was a Public Affairs legend and a journalism pioneer. He encouraged me to think even farther outside the box than I ever dared to, and when I stepped too far out on that limb, he never left me hanging out there. He supported me, defended me, molded me and made me better at my craft. Art was an old school newsman, a true professional and a great human being. The PA community has lost a treasure, and I have lost one of my dearest friends."

Jerry Dalton, Gerry Hickman, John Hinds, Jerry Stringer and others wrote similar memorials that recalled Art's unique and remarkable qualities.

Robert L. Scott, Jr.

World War II hero, Robert L. Scott, Jr., who served as the Director of Information in the Office of the Secretary of the Air Force from April 1955 to August 1956, died February 27 in Warner Robins, Georgia. He was 97.

A 1932 graduate of the U. S. Military Academy he flew air mail in 1934. Flying the P-40 Warhawk, he was credited with shooting down 13 Japanese aircraft in the China-Burma-India theater and was awarded three Distinguished Flying Crosses, two Silver Stars and five Air Medals.

He chronicled his exploits with the Flying Tigers in the best seller "God Is My Co-Pilot" which was made into a movie starring Dennis Morgan. He ended his career as the commander of Luke AFB, Arizona, retiring in 1957 as a Brigadier General.

Ken Blackshaw, who flew co-pilot with him several times when he was at SAF/OI said, "He was quite a guy and everybody loved him."

Don Stewart

Don Stewart, who was Michael Bauer on the soap opera "The Guiding Light" for 16 years, died of lung cancer January 9 at his home in Santa Barbara, California. He was 70. There was, however, another Don Stewart. Before his acting career

he was an Air Force pilot for six years – one of the youngest aircraft commanders in Strategic Air Command(SAC). He was a strong



advocate of the Air Force. In the 1970s he produced and voiced-over radio spots for Air Force Reserve recruiting and employer support of the National Guard for the Indianapolis, Indiana, based 9014th Reserve Information Squadron.

After the "Guiding Light," he moved to California, and worked in commercials, movies, television, and the theater.
