After the President's Luncheon, we will move on to the Center for the Intrepid, the world's most technologically advanced rehabilitation center for military amputees and burn victims. This 65,000 square foot facility, adjacent to Brooke Army Medical Center, was privately funded and is the single largest private contribution to our wounded warriors in the history of our country.

Friday night, an optional dinner at "The Republic of Texas" followed by a champagne & dessert boat ride is planned.

Saturday morning, May 17th, there will be guest speakers, followed by the annual update from SAF/PA. Our Annual Membership Meeting will be in the afternoon.

Our menu for the Saturday evening banquet includes some Texas favorites – a choice of breast of chicken with a roasted poblano cream sauce or mesquite smoked brisket and beef sausage with a homemade Jack Daniels BBQ sauce.

Jerry Dalton Gets PRSA's Top Award; 2007 Golden Anvil Presented At Philly Conference

Jerry Dalton, a Lifetime Founder of AFPAAA, was presented the Public Relations Society of America's top award, the Golden Anvil, for a lifetime of accomplishments and service in the field of public relations. The presentation was made in

October at PRSA's 2007 International Conference in Philadelphia.

"It is an honor to present the Gold Anvil Award to a true pioneer in public relations," said PRSA Chair and CEO Rhoda Weiss, APR, Fellow PRSA.

"Jerry's accomplishments over the years have impacted thousands of public relations professionals and students in the government, military and private sectors. He is deeply committed to the profession and has devoted many years to serving PRSA and the Public Relations Student Society of America (PRSSA).

His 30-year career in Air Force Public Affairs ended in 1980 when he retired after five years in the SAF/PA Director's post. He was the first career PA to hold that position.

Subsequently he had a 15 year career in corporate communication positions with Electronic Data Systems, The LTV Corporation, and Vought Aircraft. That was followed by three years as an independent consultant.

"Dalton has distinguished himselfamongpublicrelations practitionersforfivedecades," said PRSA Individual Awards Subcommittee Chair Gail F. Baker, Ph.D., APR, Fellow PRSA.

"From his selection as the first Air Force career public affairs officer promoted to general officer, to his election aspresident of PRSA, Dalton's career represents a lifetime of exemplary achievement.



His selection as PRSA's 2007 Gold Anvil recipient is a befitting acknowledgment of his outstanding individual accomplishments."

Jerry joined PRSA in 1976 and was awarded his Accreditation in Public Relations the following year.

Known for an inclusive, collaborative nature and crisis management skills, he was elected national PRSA president in 1990.

"It's very important for people in any profession to give back to the profession," Jerry said when asked what advice he offers young people who are just beginning their careers.

"One way you can do that is through organizations like PRSA and PRSSA. It should be more than a monetary commitment. It means getting and staying involved as a volunteer to advance the profession and the professional."

When he was presented the Golden Anvil Award, Jerry said, "I am terribly thrilled and humbled to receive an honor that has been reserved for the past greats in this profession. I'm joining a very select group, and I could not be more pleased."



Wayne Bryant

Wayne Bryant, who was vacationing in Europe, died of an apparent heart attack October 7. He was 59. At the time of his death he was the Public Affairs planner for the 37th Training Wing at Lackland Air Force Base.

He was born in Niagara Falls, New York, and enlisted in the Air Force in 1967. Among his assignments were Vietnam, Germany, and a number of assignments in the United States. He retired in 1987 as a Master Sergeant. He then began his Civil Service career.

Wayne is survived by his wife Sandra; his children; Donna Linares, Jason, Amanda and Nicholas; seven grandchildren; his mother, Louise Channing, and his sister, Anita Henry.

Albin J. Derecki

Al Derecki, who managed the Pentagon studio for the Secretary of Defense, died in his sleep November 18 at his Fort Washington, Maryland home. He was 82.

He was born in Chicago and enlisted in the Navy in 1943. After his discharge in 1946, he joined the Army Air Forces and served in the Air Force until his retirement in 1966. His second retirement, from the Department of Defense, was in 1989.

Al is survived by his wife of 27 years, Mary F. D'Angelo of Fort Washington.

Solemnity,TraditionPreserved As Funeral Details Reduced

More retiree funerals than ever, personnel cuts, and a high operations tempo have has changed the way Air Force honor guards perform retiree funerals.

Now, instead of ten people, the funeral detail has seven people who serve as pall bearers, flag folders, flag presenter, bugler, spare, and firing party.

"The main concern people had in the change of the funeral procedures was that we wouldn't be keeping with past traditions," said Staff Sgt. David Little, U.S. Air Force Honor Guard course supervisor for base honor guards.

There are three major differences with the detail of seven: the noncommissioned officer in charge of pall bearers also is the NCO in charge of the funeral; the firing party has been reduced to three; and a spare position has been added.

The NCO of pallbearers now ensures the casket and flag are properly placed in the hearse; then joins the pallbearers and call commands to carry the casket to the gravesite, and presents the flag to the family. A video of the new funeral procedure is available on the Air Force Honor Guard Web site.

"Another concern we've heard is that people think we're taking away the '21-gun salute' by having only three people fire," said Sergeant Little. That is not true, a 21-gun salute was never done during military funeral honors. Three volleys in unison are fired. Only the president receives a 21-gun salute, and only the Navy and Army have ever performed this.

The reaction to the changes has been positive according to Sergeant Little. Bases have been having a hard time supporting the 10-person funeral, this eases the personnel strain.

But the most significant component was a long-sought breakthrough with SAF/PA. Colonel Mike Caldwell, Deputy Director of Public Affairs, agreed to forward an e-mail to Air Force Public Affairs professionals proclaiming the many AFPAAA activities and goals. This correspondence generated an immediate response.

Results of these varied endeavors have been gratifying with dozens of new members joining the roles and the number continues to grow. The Board applauds all participants in this fervent effort to increase Association membership. It's essential for each of us to devote our efforts in support of this ongoing project. Billy Dood It! Army Engineers Celebrate Air Force's Birthday


